Impressions from the 2005 Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Arkansas Assembly?

Step up to the adjective buffet and help yourself: Challenging, tender, inspiring, uplifting, informative, joyous, reflective, insightful, entertaining, hilarious, solemn, energetic, commiserative, thought-provoking, vision-filled.

Hosted by Calvary Baptist Church in Little Rock, the weekend duo of back-to-back speakers in Randall O'Brien and James Dunn left on the table hearty servings of food for thought.

O'Brien, the chairman of the religion department at Baylor University, returned to see old friends and co-workers at the church he formerly pastored. Using stories from his life and his latest book, he challenged listeners with the concept of

forgiveness. Even leaving the sanctuary at one point to illustrate Christ's spirit not being able to get into a closed heart, O'Brien related a question once asked of him: "How can I forgive if he doesn't repent? He turned it around to what he considered the real question: "How can he repent if I don't forgive."

Speaking of the destructive nature of unforgiveness, he said, "To refuse to forgive is like a person eating rat poison and waiting for the rat to die." But, he continued, "God does not give us the gift of forgiveness unless He gives us the power to forgive."

Dunn, the former director of the Baptist Joint Committee and currently a professor in the Divinity School at Wake Forest, described the Christian life as a series of "possible impossibilities." He said Christianity was by nature a "challenging religion" and lambasted a tendency in

religious culture that leaned toward "sacredization of the secular." By that he meant that "God has become kind of a national mascot. We have Yellowjackets, Razorbacks and God." He said because human beings are made in the image of God, they have the capability of freely responding to God without a man-made filter. With his well-known knack for turning a phrase, he described God as "response-able." But he said freedom and responsibility are two sides of the God-made package deal provided us. "Every freedom carries a responsibility; every responsibility has a freedom," he said. "There is no such thing as a required religion or coerced Christianity."

O'Brien and Dunn represented just two of the many flavors of the assembly, which was tied together beautifully by the musical presentations of guest worship leader Beth Maloch and Larry Reeder, minister of music at Calvary, and his team of musicians. Maloch, who grew up in Little Rock and is currently on the faculty at the University of Texas at Austin, and Reeder, a multi-talented musician, led the congregation through an inspiring blend of old favorites and contemporary songs. One of the highlights was a rousing rendition of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," an arrangement that Maloch, Reeder and the worship team created just minutes before presentation.

The featured performers furnished a bountiful fare. But there was plenty more: • Part of Friday evening was devoted to a parting salute to retiring Tom Logue and Rosie Dunham, the main faces of CBF of Arkansas for many years. Logue was hailed as a "man with at least 1,500 best friends," and Dunham for her longtime faithfulness in serving alongside and complementary to Logue. And many of



their friends will never forget Logue's recounting of a dream in which he went to heaven and found Dunham, who uses a walker, dancing on the tables. After the ceremony, attendees were treated to "dessert heaven" by the congenial hosts at Calvary. Logue was later given the title of "Coordinator Emeritus" of CBF of Arkansas.

- A love offering among their many friends and supporters generated about \$22,000 for Logue and Dunham. The offering collected from Friday and Saturday's sessions netted \$2,000 for the Rena Road Baptist Church, a CBF new church start in Van Buren.

- Saturday featured breakout sessions that focused on new curriculum, missions in the Delta, chaplaincy, and how CBF supporters can function in non-CBF churches. The session on the challenges in non-CBF churches, led by Randy Hyde of Pulaski Heights Baptist, was the most popular of the breakout sessions as "CBF Baptists in exile" shared and gave suggestions on how to deal with common problems, most dealing with misinformation or lack of information about CBF programs. Hyde encouraged those concerned to guard against labels and stereotypes and to focus much of their emphasis on CBF missions, which can draw and unite people in a common cause. *Continued on page 5*

Dr. Chester Thompson

For a first-time attendee to the CBF of Arkansas assembly, Dr. Chester Thompson came home to Camden with a lot.

Thompson, bishop of an association of churches and pastor of Zion Hill Baptist Church in Camden, attended a breakout session that provided the foundation for revamping his Sunday School curriculum, elementary to high school. He said recently he is still digesting the material but has already talked to his youth minister about his new and challenging plans.

"That breakout session on curriculum was the most productive part for me," Thompson said. "I got a lot of handouts and information that was exactly what I was looking for in trying to add freshness to our ministry.

"I want to develop our curriculum, particularly to meet the needs of all our youth, things they need to master."

Thompson, the first African-American pastor to partner with CBF of Arkansas, said he found his first assembly "very uplifting, very friendly. It made a difference for me. I was impressed that so much was done in a relatively small amount of time."

Thompson said he first became interested in CBF through Coordinator Emeritus Tom Logue and by finding information on the Partners in Hope program in Helena and the Delta through researching the website and talking with Ben Newell, the CBF missions specialists in the area. "Helena and the Delta have a special place in my heart," he said. "My wife's first job was teaching school in Helena. I have preached in several churches in eastern Arkansas. I have several friends I went to college with who live in the Delta. I just have a lot of connections in that area and was interested in the project."

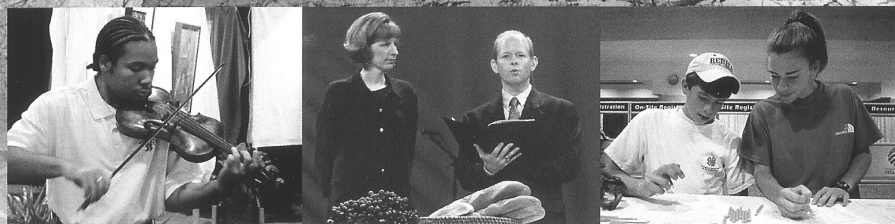

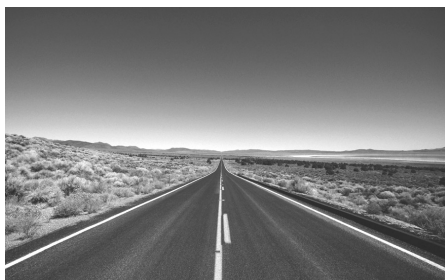

- There was plenty of critical business conducted, not the least of which was a commitment to raise a \$175,000 budget (more than double any previous amount) for July 2005 to June 2006. The coordinating council was increased to 24 people. There were commitments to developing a Fellowship Council, a group from 75 to 125 people who will be kept informed about CBF and called upon for advice and support, and a Development Council, which will develop financial opportunities for CBF Baptists to support mission, ministries and the vision of CBF.
- Dr. Ray Higgins, formerly of Second Baptist, Little Rock, who is beginning his first year as a fulltime leader of CBF Baptists in Arkansas, outlined his bold strategy that focuses on CPRO (Connect People, Resources, and Opportunities). Among his goals are regional CBF gatherings in Northwest, North Central, Northeast, Central and South Arkansas. Also, he intends to visit 100 Arkansas pastors within the year, encourage 100 Baptists to attend the

national assembly and have 10 new churches participate in the Partners for Hope Project in the Delta.

- And if all that wasn't enough, one of the most popular and tempting places between sessions was the Cokesbury Bookstore room which featured both the latest offerings on religion and culture, discipleship, and Bible study fare plus a smattering of popular old favorites. Just browsing was a delight when one could see such enticing titles, "How to Pray After You've Kicked the Dog."
- O'Brien and Hyde were also available to autograph their latest books on forgiveness and the life of David. There was also opportunity to pick up a Maloch CD.
- Saturday worship even had a gleeful topping. When Dunn finished his talk, Reeder hurried from the back of the worship center for the closing music. "I didn't know you were done," he said. "I'm always Dunn," quipped the speaker.

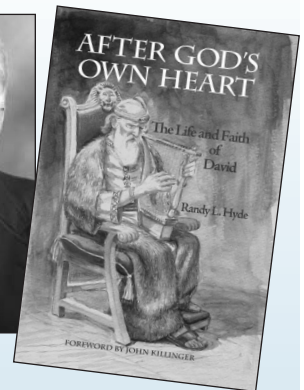

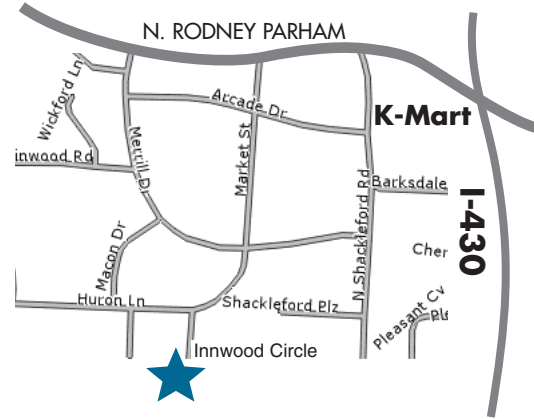
